


Day: 2 (12.09.2020)

Report

In Session I, Dr. Rama Devi Pani, AIU, New Delhi, delivered a lecture on "History of One's own Institute. "She gave a concise overview of Higher Education in India. She also talked about the MHRD, the structure of Higher Education in India, and affiliated and constituent universities across the country. She pointed out that within the "Affiliated System", PG and Research are seen as being the responsibility of the University; and UG and Teaching the responsibility of the colleges. She discussed briefly the drawbacks of this system. She also provided a brief summary of the genesis of the AIU, its structure, function and composition. We thank her for delivering such an informative lecture.

In Session II, Prof. Anand Kar, School of Life Science, Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya, Indore, MP delivered a lecture on "National and Global Trends in HE." He enlightened us on the structures, functions and teaching faculty; the roles of academic head (Vice Chancellor), administrative head (Registrar), and the stakeholders (students). He explained the hierarchy of the teachers in university and college systems. He discussed role of teachers or faculty members in holistic development of the institution and emphasised on a committed and serious approach to teaching, evaluation, extension, and overall development. He pointed out that the overall development of university

depends on the support provided to the local community, the expertise and professional experience of the teachers and their willingness to extend their service beyond their departments, and to disseminate and impart basic/applied knowledge to students and thereby assist them with the application of whatever they have learned. He also talked about the importance of skill-based teaching-learning and the usefulness of upgrading syllabus from time to time, recruitment of teachers with specialization, research and collaborative teaching and research activities. We thank him for enlightening us with such a nice lecture.

In Session III, Dr.AmrendraPani, AIU, New Delhi, delivered a lecture on the "Code of conduct, Professional Ethics, Professional relationship and network." He gave a concise overview on ethics and differences between ethics and values. He provided a brief outline of adherence of professional code of conduct and an understanding of essentials. He talked about objectives of a Code in details and responsibilities of teachers with other stakeholders in academics. He enlightened the major ethical issues and dilemmas. Finally, he focused on the Professional relationship and network. We thank him for delivering such an informative lecture.

In Session IV, Prof. C.D. Agashe, Director, Institute of Teachers Education, PRSU, Raipur has delivered a lecture on "Addressing problems of the students and constructive approach towards teaching and support for students learning." Then the speaker brought to our attention the difficulty faced by students such as language barriers, time management, physical discomfort/lack of physical fitness, social problems such as poverty, ostracism, and also bullying and ragging, behavioural problems, fear of failure, emotional problems, mood disorders, etc. In order to solve these problems, the speaker suggested that we should keep in mind that thinking is essential for learning, and that thinking and memory are inextricably intertwined with each other and this connection plays a crucial role in learning all types of skills for language learning and intellectual development. In a broad sense, thinking includes all forms of cognitions, perceptions, imagination, memory and conception. Without imagination we cannot function emotionally, our memories wouldn't work. Prof Agashe further said that in learning, perception plays a very important role, and in this connection, he discussed the extent to which learning can be understood as perceptual change in students. He focused on the usefulness of learning strategies and discussed skills in rehearsing a material to be learned or in organizing it into main theme, and talked about behavioural learning strategies and the need for the teachers to be available for student support in this regard. Report on Lectures

Session - I (10:30 to 12:00)

The Chairperson started the session by introducing and welcoming the respected speaker. The first session was presented by Prof. LS Nigam, Vice Chancellor of ShankaracharyaVishwavidyala, Bhilai. He delivered a very factual lecture was on "University Act, Statute, Ordinances and its role and importance in governance". Also from his illuminating speech we got to know about the historical evolution of the universities in India from affiliating university to set up of teaching department and the role of constitution in setting up those universities. On a brief discussion he also pointed out the role of UGC, importance of UGC Act and specially on how 2F can help to build a university. Here he addressed that state assembly and parliaments get involved with 2F to set up a university. He in front of us held a clear perception of the Central, State and the Private universities and also elaborated the function of act, statute, ordinance and regulation of universities. An insightful note on the function of academic council and executive councils was elaborated by Prof. Nigam and we also got to learn the difference between the officials and authorities of universities in terms of members, roles and functions. In his end notes Prof. Nigam specified the role of the chancellors and vice chancellors of the Universities. Discussions were going on during the session. Lastly, the chairperson and also other participants thank him for delivering such an informative lecture.

Session – II (12:15 to 13:45)

The second session was also the continuation of first session, where Prof. LS Nigam, Vice Chancellor of ShankaracharyaVishwavidyala, Bhilai presented the role and responsibilities of Pro Vice Chancellor, importance of this post and why this post has been created in some universities. He pointed out that Registrar cell works under the general control of Vice Chancellor. He clarified vividly the difference in terms of roles between the post of Deputy Registrar and Assistant Registrar. He mentioned that though Asst. Registrar is of a lessened post than Deputy Registrar but it depends on delegation of duties. He also emphasised focusing on

the work of other officers like Finance officer, Statuary office etc. At the end note he had drawn a very comprehensible attention on the formation, role and functions of authorities like court, executive council and academic council, Board of Studies in university. After that he nicely cleared the doubts of the participants and discussed with them. Lastly, the chairperson delivered a formal vote of thanks. The participants also thank him for delivering such a nice lecture.

Session – III (14:15 to 15:45)

The Chairperson started the session by introducing and welcoming the respected speaker. The third session was led by Prof. A.K. Pati, Vice chancellor of GM University, Sambalpur,Odisha. His topic was "CurrentChallenges and Opportunities in Indian Higher Education." Firstly he made a comparison regarding publication in peer review journal among India, USA and China. He pointed out that India have less number of publication in peer reviewed journal comparison to China and USA in all disciplines. India holds the share of research articles (5.31) where China has 20.67% followed by USA with a share of 16.54% in terms of the country's leading the world in scientific publication. He pointed out that Students' mobility towards India is very less and can be said 'poor' than the other part of the world. He also mentioned about the All India Survey on Higher education 2018-19 report. Lastly he discussed how to make Vishwa Guru India and provided valuable suggestions to solve the barriers to be Visha Guru. Discussions were going on during the session. Lastly, the chairperson and also other participants thank him for delivering such an informative lecture.

Session – IV (16:00 to 17:30)

The third session was followed by the last and fourth session. This session was also headed by Prof. A.K. Pati, Vice Chancellor of GM University,

Sambalpur. Here he made us focused on the challenging issues of limited teacher, less institutional autonomy, inadequate mechanism for merit based career

management and progression of faculty. Also he highlighted that very few HEI teach in local languages. He also appraised on how NEP-2020 addresses

some of these challenges through there structural and procedural aspects like the several short term (within < 5 years) and medium term plans (within < 10

years). Later on he called our attention by focusing on the challenges faced during the virtual meeting and classes in present covid situation. Following this

he pointed out that overexposure to man-made technologies also the radiation of blue light coming out from several devices like tab, smart phone etc. have

adverse impact on our sleeping time as well as on our biological clock. He also stressed on the many physiological and psychological problems likely to

have connections with the arousal of the COVID pandemic like COVID Jet-lag. After finishing his lecture and also during the session he nicely cleared the

doubts of the participants and discussed with them.

At the end note the chairperson on the behalf of all the participants expressed her heartful thanks to the respected speakers Prof. L S Nigam Sir, Prof.A K

Pati Sir, also to the Director Prof. A K Gupta Sir, and the Course Co-ordinator Dr. ArvindAgrawal Sir. She also thanked the participants for their

Day: 5 (15.09.2020)

All participants joined the Google Meet on time.

Session – **I**(10:30 am)

The chairperson, Dr. Arunima Datta, introduced the speaker, Dr. Prashant Srivastava, Department of Geology, Govt. Science College, Durg. Dr. Srivastava delivered his lecture entitled "Framing curricular objectives and organization of content, co-connecting content with appropriate learning resources, pedagogical principal and assessment; integrating and interlinking courses" (Lecture 16 Module 2)

He talked about how curricula are developed, their objectives, organisation of content, social valency, etc. involving the process of selecting, organizing, executing, and evaluating learning experiences on the basis of the needs, abilities and interests of the learners and other stakeholders of society. He pointed out that framing a globally competitive curriculum that is smart, specific, measurable, achievable, realistic, time-bound, curriculum, is a team work, and that it involves the requirements of different stakeholders. Board of Studies is, therefore, composed of the representatives of different segments of society. He expressed concern at the extant gap between the demands of the industry or marketability and the curriculain Indian Higher Education system. Dr. Srivastava cited B. Rudyand and H. Henry's definition of curriculum, as well as the definition by Cunninghous and the Hilda Taba Model. Common concepts may exist between two subjects, although they are to be approached using different methodologies. Dr. Srivastava, then, explained various types of curricula such as Core Curriculum, Integrated Curriculum, The Overt, Explicit or Written Curriculum, Societal Curriculum, Hidden or Covert Curriculum, Internal Curriculum, etc.

The lecture was followed by a lively Question and Answer session.

Tea Break

Session – **II**(12:15pm)

Dr. Prashant Srivastava continued with his lecture and enumerated certain methods and techniques that need to be implemented when preparing curriculum objectives. The functioning of the educational institutions is primarily based upon what kind of curriculum objectives have been put into operation. The groundwork of objectives is one way in which a teacher or an educationist can begin to think plainly and critically about the educational procedures and the contribution that they have made towards these procedures.

In the design of curriculum objectives, they should be given a hierarchicalorder. The curriculum objectives should not only emphasise on the learning errands, materials and the academic ideas, but they should also concentrateon the zones that are vigorous in indoctrinating the qualities of ethics, standards, virtue and honesty amongst the individual. Dr. Srivastava also talked about the significance of improvement of communication skills amongst the teachers and the students and pointed out the role of group discussions in this regard.

The lecture was followed by a lively Question and Answer session.

The chairperson, Dr. Arunima Datta, proposed a formal Vote of Thanks to the speaker, Dr. Prashant Srivastava.

Session – III(2:10 pm)

The chairperson, Dr. Arunima Datta, introduced the speaker, Prof. SP Adhikary, who delivered his

lectured entitled "Student evaluation using Outcome Based Learning - connection with the Choice-Based Credit System". In this lecture, he talked about the history and evolution of Choice Based Credit System, Outcome-based learning in connection with CBCS, minimum course curriculum for undergraduate courses under CBCS, the initiation of New Education Policy in 2015 by Ministry of Human Resource Development (HRD), and its aims of brining

even-handedness, competence and academic excellence through innovation and improvement in course-curricula, introduction of paradigm shift in learning and teaching pedagogy, evaluation system. He gave an in-depth view of the CBCS structure and the courses such as Core, Generic, SEC, AECC, DSE, and credits attached with them. He spoke about the CBCS in the context of Fakir Mohan University. A large number of HEIswere initiated into the semester system to make education in India more global in outlook. The CBCS aims to re-orient the education system by innovative "learning centric approach". Flexibility in education system was intended, which would allow students, depending upon their interests, to selectinterdisciplinary, intra-disciplinary and skill-based courses.

Session – **IV**(The previous session continued)

In a paper entitled "History and evolution of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)" Prof. SP Adhikary discussed the various advantages of the CBCS and the change in focus from teacher-centric to student-centric education. Students are free to undertake as many credits as they can cope with and they can choose interdisciplinary, intradisciplinary courses, skill-oriented papers with more flexibility of subject combinations, and of studying at different times and at different institutions to complete their degrees. He also talked about the implementation of the CBCS and the infrastructural parameters required for adopting CBCS. He also gave a comparison between Previous academic structure and New Pedagogical and Curricular Structure. He pointed out the State-wise implementation of CBCS and the administrative steps required to implemented it. Academic credit bank and credit transfer provisions shall be kept.

The lecture was followed by a lively Question Answer session.

The chairperson, Dr. Arunima Datta, proposed a formal Vote of Thanks to the speaker, Dr. Prashant Srivastava.

This was followed by a small discussion by Dr. Ashwini Kumar Gupta, Director, HRDC, PRSU, Raipur, on learning outcomes and evaluation in the current scenario.

We,the 38 participants from five different states across India,have witnessed another scintillating day of our online induction programme that is scheduled to be held from 11th September to 10th October 2020. This is the 6th day of our programme and I,being a reporter of the happenings on the said date (16.09.2020),writing the report on behalf of all the participants. Today we had four distinguished speakers who spoke on different aspects of Module 2 which is on Curricular Designing. In the following, I propose to report in detail each of the four presentations:

1.Curriculum: Idea,Designing and Content Organisation by Prof.NinadBodhankar: In the Lecture 20 of our course, Prof.NinadBodhankar very beautifully pointed out all the nitty gritties of the concept of Curriculum,itsdefinition,its structures and three-model designing of curriculum. He started his brilliant discussion with some questions and made us think straightway and led us to the points of his discussion. Questions like,how are we going to evaluate our students in this digital era? And how was our first day in our institution? literally compelled us to think on the role of teacher. Then he moved on to the focal point of his discussion. He mentioned that designing a curriculum needs a lot of research and it is the most important facet of education. A curriculum is formed through several stages of modifications and approval. At first, BOS members, a group of experts in the concerned fields restructure and redesign the existing curriculum and pass on to the academic council and then to the vice chancellor of university. Finally it is approved. Then Prof. Bodhankar mentioned all the sources of definition. He also mentioned that there were three widely known curriculum models, namely-Tyler's model, Hilda Taba's Grassroot model and Galen Saylor and William Alexander's model. In fact, in all these three models, there are ten different types of curriculum. Above all, it was a pleasing experience to hear Prof. NinadBodhankar and certainly his presentation enlightened us.

2.Idea of the Choice Based Credit System: Opportunities and Challenges of Implementation by Dr. Rama Devi Pani: In the second lecture of today, which was Lecture 21 of Module 2, Dr.Pani talked about the opportunities and challenges of choice based credit system. Before going to in depth analysis on CBCS, she reminded us to think over the higher education system in India and specially its examination system. She repeatedly mentioned about the dynamic nature of education which is a constant process. Everything related to education like, educator, educand, content is part of this dynamic nature. We need to be flexible and objective and open minded for any experimentation. She pointed out that this CBCS is part of that experimentation and solution to this age-old education system, specially examination process. The credit-based system essentially implies a redefining of the curriculum into smaller measurable entities or modules. Then she pointed out the subject structure, credit system and grade system. In this system, CGPA is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses in all semesters. She also put light on the NEP's

majorrecommendations. This new educational policy offers flexibility of subjects, allowance to multiple entry/exit and academic bank of credits. She ended her discussion with a quotation of King

Whitney Jr. that change has a considerable psychological impact on the human mind and it was highly motivating for us.

- 3.Taxonomies of Instructional Objectives:Bloom's Taxonomy and Revised Blooms's Taxonomy by Dr.Pragya Kulkarni: In the third lecture, from 2.15 p.m. to 3.45 p.m., Dr.Pragya Kulkarni enlightened us on Bloom's taxonomy and its revised taxonomy. The main motto of this taxonomy is learning in action and this model is named after Benjamin Bloom. This cognitive model is highly popular in school education, but Dr. Kulkarni discussed this model from the perspectives of higher education. It is a set of three hierarchial models used to classify educational learning objectives into levels of complexity and specificity. The three lists cover the learning objectives in cognition, affective and psychomotor domains. In the affective domain, people react emotionally and in the last domain, skills describe the ability to physically manipulate a tool or instrument. Besides, affective domain focuses on attitude, motivation, willingness and incorporating into real life. Psychomotor domain focuses on performing sequences of motor activities to a specified level of accuracy, smoothness, rapidity of force. Then she mentioned the revised Bloom's taxonomy which was developed by Anderson an Krathwohl in 2001. This revised taxonomy is the fusion or the incorporation of both the cognitive domain as the intersection of the cognitive process domain and the knowledge dimension. So, the changes in the revised version can be noted in three categories: changes in terms, structural change and change in emphasis. She presented with simple language this complex, yet interesting model.
- 4.Evolution of the Higher Education Sector of India by Prof.S.K.Pandey: In the last lecture, which was the Lecture 23 (Module 2) of our FIP course, Prof. S. K. Pandey, former Vice Chancellor of Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, mentioned the growth and evolution of higher education in India. He started his discussion by mentioning the ancient institutions like Nalanda, Takshashila and how these educational institutions were demolished by different emperors during the Mughal Empire. Then we were under the British Rule and the significance of the years like 1813,1835 and 1857 are highly important to understand the education system under the British rule. Then after the independence, there were mainly three educational reforms and at last the latest policy of the 21st century. Then he talked about the flexible and objective recommendations of the NEP. In this short period of time, he mentioned everything related to the evolution of higher education sector in India. He also did not forget to remind us the role of teacher, role of researcher in this constant dynamic process of education. As a teacher, we should enjoy teaching and inculcate among the students the new aspects of education with conviction and enthusiasm. Overall, we enjoyed all the lectures and interacted with the speakers. There were some technical glitches and I also faced it. All the 38 participants were present in all the four sessions of today's lecture. It was an engaging day and we all had engrossing interaction and experience with the speakers.

Session - I (10:30 to 12:00) 10:30 am: Welcome Address was delivered by the Chairperson Prof Biplab Halder and the speaker was formally

10:34 am: Commencement of Session I. Summary of the Lecture: Prof. Ahluwalia gave a detailed and exhaustive lecture in the form of a case study of HPU on "Choice Based Credit System: Opportunities and Challenges towards Academic Reforms" in close connection with the National Education Policy 2020. According to him, existing universities must ensure frequent curricula revisions, introduction of course credit system, enhancing reliance on internal assessment, encouraging research, and reforming governance of institutions. In the present system there is a lack of context-based approach and opportunities for Group work, Individual work, Data collection, Field work, Quizzes, Class tests, Community involvement are limited. No inter-disciplinary mobility is possible and there is a dearth of multi-disciplinarily, closed isolated environment, lack of choices for students, and hardly any scope to introduce latest knowledge in the curriculum. The learning goals of the course and learning objectives of the units/subunits never enunciated. The CBCS on the other hand aims at making the curriculum interdisciplinary, cutting edge developments in technologies occur at the interface of two or more disciplines, interdisciplinary approach enables integration of concepts, theories, techniques, and perspectives from two or more disciplines to advance fundamental understanding or to solve problems whose solutions are beyond the scope of a single discipline. It allows students to learn at their own pace and Choose electives from a wide range of courses,

undergo additional courses and acquire more than required number of credits, adopt an interdisciplinary approach in learning, inter college/University transfer of Credits Complete a part of programme in the parent institute and get enrolled in another institution for specialized courses. 12:04 pm -12:15 pm: Tea Break.

Session – II (12:15 to 13:45) 12:16 pm: Commencement of Session II. Summary of the Lecture: Prof. Ahluwalia continued his talk on "Choice Based Credit System: Opportunities and Challenges towards Academic Reforms". In elucidating the different nitty-gritty's of the CBCS, the speaker discussed the following issues: the structure of a typical semester, levels of certifications, course components, definitions and types of credits, their measurement and patters, relationship between number of credits and marks per paper, programs of study, types of courses like Core, Elective, Open, Audit, course-wise distribution of credits for a program or level of study, alphanumeric code for subject/department, evaluation, marks distribution, maintenance of record of attendance and comprehensive continuous assessment, converting Raw Score into Grades, Final Result Grades, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA), Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) and they way

they are calculated, Absolute Grading vs Relative Grading. He also talked about the challenges faced while implementing such a system, role of Working Groups/ Board of Studies of a particular subject, Body of the syllabus, Frequently Asked Questions related to CBCS, and other issues. 1:43 pm - 1:55 pm: Question Answer Session 1:56 pm: A Vote of Thanks was proposed by the Chairperson, Prof Biplab Halder. 2:00 pm - 2:15pm: Lunch

Session – III (14:15 to 15:45) 2:30 pm: Commencement of Session III. Link for MCQ Test (Module 2) was provided by HRDC to be completed within 15 minutes. 2:45 pm: Brainstorming Session. The topic "Outcome-Based Learning". This session was moderated by Dr Keshav Kant Sahu, HoD and Associate professor at School of Studies in Biotechnology, Pt.Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. The participants were divided into four groups Group-A (Roll 1-10), Group-B (Roll 11-20), Group-C (Roll 21-30), GroupD(Roll 31-39). Dr. Sahu called out their names at random from each group and asked them to briefly express their views on the given topic. The participants' response was original and thoughtful. Session – IV (16:00 to 17:30) 4:08 pm: Commencement of Session IV

Summary of the Lecture: Prof C.D. Agashe delivered a lecture entitled "My Style of Teaching: Like Stars on Earth Every Child is Special" The lecture engaged with the question: "Is it possible to teach every child same way and same kind of skill?" It speculated about the necessity of basic knowledge base in the service of society. He talked about the need to compliment traditional teaching with learning by doing and how the New Education Policy 2020 is aiming to address this need. He argued that early childhood care and education is one of the best investments a country can make to promote human resource development and that early childhood education is more than preparation for primary school. He enumerated the five critical domains of learning as social, emotional, physical, cognitive and language and how teaching should correspond to these domains and help in the development of their motor skills, balance, metacognition and co-ordination with meaningful activities. Prof. Agashe discussed Metacognitive knowledge at length with respect to the learner's knowledge of their own cognitive abilities, particular tasks, and learning strategies. He also talked about exploring metacognitive regulation with the help of Tacit learners, Aware learners, Strategic learners & Reflective learners; the identification of learners on continuum from tacit to reflective. 



DAY: 11 (21.09.2020)



Session I (10:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon) 10.30 a.m. At the beginning, the Chairperson of today's program, Mrs. Smita Girgune delivered the welcome address, 10.33 a.m. Mrs. Girgune invited today's first speaker, Prof. K. V. Arya, who is a Professor at ABV-Indian Institute of Information Technology & Management (IIITM), Gwalior, India. He delivered the speech on Building effective teaching-research links at the curriculum level. Summary: Prof. Arya point out the dual role of Professor as researchers and teachers in details. He also discussed about definition of research, its objectives. He also described research with impact strategy of 2020. In this respect he pointed out about four interlinked strands. He also focused on how to write literature review. Discussed about some key questions and issues regarding research for learning. He raised the question about is research useful for teaching? How can university help professor in transfer of knowledge? He discussed about different activities of a professor. He also described how different issues could be improves teaching activity and through this how institutional level can be improved. The session was ended with interaction. Many participants sorted out their confusion by asking questions to Prof Arya. The session was ended at 12:15 p.m. 12:15 p.m noon to 12:30 p.m – Tea Break Session II (12:30 p.m. to 1.45 p.m) 12:15 p.m – The session was continued with Prof. Arya. In this session he delivered lecture on Designing inter-disciplinary and collaborative research projects in specific disciplines. He started with what is interdisciplinary research. He also discussed about values, shortcoming and risks of interdisciplinary research and then elaborated the generic barriers of IDR. Here he showed the point of view of students, research and faculty members, educators, academic institutions and also elaborated the recommendations from NAAC. He also mentioned some websites of research funding agencies and how they support with fund. He also raised questions if IDR successfully generate a new way of knowledge creation or not. He also suggested to improve our English language and vocabulary and suggested to keep a notebook of newly acquainted words. 1.23p.m - Question/Answer Session began Some participants raised some valuable questions which were answered by the speaker. 1.51 p.m - Vote of thanks were given by the Chairperson. 1:52 p.m - End of session II. Session III (2:20 p.m to 4: p.m) 2:22 p.m - Introduction to the speaker Prof. Anisur Rahman, who is currently Professor and Director, UGC-Human Resource Development Centre, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi.

2:23 p.m - Prof. Anisur Rahman started the session with a note on the professional development of Higher education in India and how the roles of professional teaching learning go on together. From independence era to modern India Educational Institutions have had been grown but the quality of teaching learning remained poor. He talked about how RUSA, HRDC etc. continuously engaged to motivate teachers. Thus he presented his slide presentations on Challenges in Higher Education in India. Reporting of 20th Day (30.09.2020) Guru-Dakshta Online Faculty Induction Programme Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, HRDC, Raipur, Chattisgarh Name of the Reporter- Tapati Das Name of the Chairperson- Sonali Munda This is the 20th day of our Guru-Dakshta Online Faculty Induction Programme(FIP2) and I Tapati Das, as the reporter of the day (30.09.2020) am writing the report on behalf of all the participants. Today we the 38 participants have enriched with the valuable words by our two respected resource persons, Who delivered their lectures on different topics of Module6 (on Research, Professional Development and Academic Leadership). I propose to report in detail each of the four sessions: 1.Lecture76 (Module6) Conceiving both teaching and research to strengthen the connections between the two by Prof. P.Malayadri- In this lecture Prof. Malayadri very beautifully described the interrelation between teaching and research in higher education. He divided his discussion broadly in three sections -balancing between teaching and research, relationship between teaching and research, and the ways to strengthen the connectivity of teaching and research. He emphasised on developing moral values and ethics in teachers while discussing on how to balance between teaching and research. He also mentioned about positive attitudes towards student, towards work environment, goals oriented teaching and research. While discussing on relationship between teaching and research he nicely said that teaching inspires research and they share a common skill set. The concept of student centric learning becomes a reality, when he explained how students can be motivated to learn if they also involved in research process. He said research based, research led, research oriented, and research informed curriculum is the need of the hour. During the session he well addressed some questions of participants like how teachers can continue their research beside other professional duties, how students can help teachers in their research. Overall it was a very interesting session with new experiences. 2.Lecture77(Module6) Preparing to become a PhD guide: roles and responsibility by P.Malayadri: In the second lecture Sir talked about the preparation to become a PhD guide. Before going to the deep analysis on the process to be a PhD guide, he focused on the UGC's existing guidelines to become a guide. He emphasised on quality research papers for the aspirants, and also only a substantive post holder can do the supervision and he focused on other aspects as well. Then he discussed about the need to become a PhD guide, here he significantly pointed out teachers own academic development, increase of institutional prestige and ranking

and most importantly contribution to the society. He brilliantly guided us about the roles and responsibilities of a PhD guide. He put many examples of demoralised PhD guides who often violate professional ethics for their personal gain. According to him a PhD guide should support the scholars to his level best, motivate them to write papers, timely supervise their assignments, guide them for getting correct jobs, and empathically guides should handle the research process. Sir guided some of our participants who asked questions related to the topic. And he also motivated all the participants to prepare for becoming a guide. Above all it was a pleasing experience to hear Prof. Malayadri.

3.Lecture78 (Module6) Research ethics-Academic honesty and integrity, consent and its implications, converting a thesis into authentic publication ready materials by Prof.Anand Kar: It was today's 3rd session, Prof. Kar started his lecture By defining the term 'Academic', which include teaching and research. He reminded us research should be guided by ethics and meant for the global purpose. He mentioned different types of research like theoretical, data based, experiment based, lab based, field based and clinical based. Then he discussed about various types of publications. He gave us detail knowledge about publishing online, and also in magazine, newspaper, souvenirs. He briefly told us articles may be of different types, and we should publish quality research papers. He described teacher's role in ethical issues, academic integrity, and carefulness. According to him teachers of every discipline should practice ethics as per the nature of their respective

stream. He brilliantly explored the duties of researchers and technicians, and the role of the supervisors while doing so very beautifully used some real life experience which enlightened us very much. In the concluding section he influenced us to publish original researches and also made us conscious about plagiarism and data theft. 4.Lecture79(Module6) Importance of and strategies for staying updated with developments in teaching and in one's own discipline by Prof. Anand Kar: This was today's 4th session where Prof.Kar gave a brief lecture following a brilliant interaction with participants. He suggested academicians should update themselves with very recent findings in their specialised fields, only text books are not sufficient for teaching. He emphasised on the need of consulting quality journals and publications for a better and updated teaching. He said very rightly teaching needs more preparation and practice. He guided us for different types of publications like writing reviews, chapters in edited books, proceeding papers etc. At last he gave us some take home messages which were the brief points of the sessions among them the most important message was 'Start your research when you really interested to do that'. Overall we enjoyed all the lectures and interacted with the speakers. All the 38 participants were present in all the four sessions of today's lecture. It was an engaging day and we all had great interaction and experience with the speakers.

DAY: 21 (01.10.2020)

Faculty Induction Program (Gurudakshta)-02 Day: 21st DATE: October 01, 2020 Attendance: All participants of the FIP-02 had actively participated and involved in the discussions throughout all four (04) sessions of twenty first (21st) day of this program. Report The resource person for the first two sessions of the day was Prof. Arun S. Kharat from SLS life Sciences JNU, New Delhi, who delivered his lectures on the topic "Fundamental of strategic and transformational leadership" of Module 7, while Dr. Superna Sengupta from Pt. Ravishanker Shukla University, Raipur took rest of the two post-lunch sessions on the topic "Software tools for research and for plagiarism check: Latex, Bibliographic, End Note, Bibtex, Turnitin, Statistical, other open sources tools; data in the public domain" of Module 6 and "Defining academic integrity" of Module 7 respectively. He also emphasis on Scopus and its selection criteria for indexing, Web of Science, Various types of Open Access, UGC-CARE list and roles and responsibilities of Universities in regulating the quality research in India. In the third session Dr. Sengupta described about various ICT tools that could be used in research writings. He not only discussed but also explained about how to operate the different software for content management, reference management, e-learning management, paraphrasing tools and Plagiarism detecting tools. While speaking to his next topic on "Defining academic integrity" of Module 7, in the last session, Dr. Sengupta explained us about the different types of academic dishonesty that are being practised in the academic field and the reasons for these practices. He also made us understand about our roles and responsibilities in regulating the scientific misconduct. Only one participant named Hira Prasad Yadav found to be absent in 2 nd, 3th and 4th sessions. The day was started with nice informal conversation between the resource person of the 1st session, Prof. P Malayadri Sir; Dr. Arvind Agarwal Sir and participants. Session - I (10:30 to 12:00) The Chairperson started the session by introducing and welcoming the resource person of the 1st session, Prof. P Malayadri; ICSSR Senior Fellow, Begumpet, Hyderabad. His topic of discussion was Plagiarism: types, issues and consequences; ways and means of protecting students and teachers from plagiarism. Prof. P Malayadri Sir started his lecture with brief introduction about Plagiarism. Then he nicely discussed the topic with power point presentation. From his illuminating speech the participants got to know about what is plagiarism; considerations of plagiarism; types of plagiarism (Direct copying, Verbatim Reproduction, Idea Plagiarism etc.). He also pointed out the reason behind plagiarism i.e. lack of writing skills, forgetting citation etc.; consequences of plagiarism like student reputation, teacher reputation, suspension etc. He gave a clear perception of the ways and means of protecting students and teachers from plagiarism like giving proper citation, presenting own idea, rewriting proof reading etc. Lastly he shared some names of software for plagiarism checking which was very useful to the participants. After his lecture Prof. P Malayadri Sir discussed with the participants and cleared their doubts. At the end of the session, the Chairperson delivered the formal vote of thanks. Other participants also thanked Prof. P Malayadri Sir for delivering such an informative and insightful lecture. Session – II (12:15 to 13:45) The Chairperson started the session by introducing and welcoming the resource person of the 2nd session and 3rd session, Dr. Poonam Singh; Associate Professor, Dept. of Economics, SRS Girls PG College, Bareilly. Dr. Poonam Singh madam presented her lecture on 'Academic Integrity in Higher Education: Challenges in High-tech Era' with power point presentation. She nicely explained the meaning of Academic Integrity by breaking the words. Session – III (14:15 to 15:45) This session was the continuation of the 2nd session where the Chairperson started the session by welcoming Dr. Poonam Singh Madam. Then Madam started her lecture by continuing the topic of the 2nd session. She explained the document of UGC which was mentioned in the previous session. After her lecture she discussed with the participants and cleared their doubts. Then she delivered her lecture on the topic 'Information Literacy' with power point presentation. She emphasized on the meaning of

Information Literacy; the types of Information Literacy i.e. Information Literacy, Media Literacy, Digital Literacy etc. She nicely pointed out about "who is an information literate person". DAY: 24 (04.10.2020)

FIP: GURU DAKSHTA DAY 24 REPORT dated 04/10/2020 Organized by HRDC-PRSU, Raipur, From 11/9/2020 to 10/9/2020 By Dr. Arunima Datta Roll No.-o7 The day started on 10.35 am with the opening speech by the Chairperson of the day, Dr. Arun Kumar Kashyap, Assistant Professor, Zoology, Bilaspur where he introduced Dr. Niraj Kumar Jha, Associate Professor of Political Science, MLB arts and Commerce College, Gwalior, MP, who then engaged the audiences in the first two consecutive sessions. In the first session Dr. Jha introduced the team to the very concept of "Politics", not only as a term, but also as the inherent essence of the functionality of any institution or state. He emphasized on the fact that how without the political practices, there will be ensuing chaos and proper functioning of the authorizing bodies cannot be done. Then he further delved into the concept of Fundamental as well as human rights of individuals. He elaborated on the basic core values and essence of constitution as well as the constitutional rights of every Indian citizen therein. He explained to the audience about Constitutionalism and the preamble of the Indian Constitution. The 7 core values of the constitution and their adoption in every sphere of life and the roles of teachers were also clarified by Dr. Jha in a very conducive manner. In the second session he explained the Fundamental Rights and the Human Rights of individual and also compared and elaborated on the implications of both. The lecture also consisted of the details of the morals and norms of human rights as elaborated in the UDHR, 10/12/1948. He beautifully summarized all the 30 articles of UDHR into eight explanatory points viz; due process right, liberty rights, political rights, equality rights, social rights, minority and group rights and last but not the least the right to dissent. In order to get the complete idea of the Fundamental Rights of the citizens, Dr. Jha recommended the audience to read the compendium of Fundamental Rights, part III of the Constitution, along with the Directive Principles provided in part IV and also the Fundamental Duties provided in the part IVA. He lucidly explained the eleven types of duties mentioned in the Constitution to be followed by the citizens of India. He concluded his lecture by summarizing the implications and suggestions that can be followed and practiced by the learners and teachers of the Higher Education Institutes of the country. He mentioned that education is the aid which can only make people conscious of their fundamental rights and make them aware of their duties that are to be followed in building the nation. He urged the Educator audiences to try and become the role models of the society and spread awareness and inculcate respect for education amongst the common. Post lunch the following two sessions were engaged by Dr. Rana Singh, Vice Chancellor of Sanskriti University, Mathura, UP. Dr. Singh addressed the audience on "Looking beyond stereotypical generalizations learning respect and tolerance Importance of 'universal' values truth, righteous conduct, peace, non-violence" and also on "Anchoring professional ethics in universal values". In his engaging lecture he elucidated the differences between the stereotypes and the generalizations that people do in daily life. He emphasized on the fact these stereotypes and generalizations actually arise from being judgmental in thoughts and due to lack of information. These erroneous actualizations may lead to conflicts and finally obstructs the formation of a global classroom. He pointed out the stereotyped

generalizations regarding gender, religion and opinions etc. He asked the audience to take pledges on Respect and Tolerance and also urged the teacher educators to follow and include them in their pedagogical practices as well. After briefly including

the core values mentioned in the Constitution preamble he also focused on the Fundamental Rights and Duties of citizens and also included that in order to maintain the unity, integrity, just and honorable relationships between the nations we not only need to abide by the international laws and treaties, obligations etc, but also have to persuade settlements of international disputes by arbitrations. Dr. Singh also focused on attainment of peace by lifestyle management and self training to be patient and tolerant. The sessions were concluded by formal vote of thanks offered by the Chairperson to the Director, HRDC-PRSU, Raipur, Dr. A. K. Gupta, FIP Course Co-ordinator, Dr. Arvind Agarwal and the entire FIP team. The day ended with the conduction of FIP Module -8 MCQ test.

Session 4: The Valedictory Session




